## Police Department 2011 Annual Awards & Nominations

The Police Department is pleased to announce its 2011 Award Recipients and Nominees. All of the following employees were nominated by their supervisors.

### Award Recipients:

#### **Employees of the Year** **Lynn Perry & Nancy Lindstrom**

Lynn has been employed by the Billings Police Department since 2004 and has worked at HIDTA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area) since 2006 as an Administrative Support Specialist. She is a team player who takes her job and its responsibilities to the next level. Lynn has taken the initiative to be a Certified Evidence Technician, something that isn't even required for her position. Those at HIDTA have come to depend on her and the work that she does processing evidence, allowing the officers more time to work on their caseloads. It's comforting to those in HIDTA knowing that Lynn is in the office taking care of business when everyone else is out of the office working on projects.

Nancy is a seven-year veteran of the Animal Shelter and was promoted to Senior Animal Control Officer in 2011. Her willingness to take the extra steps

necessary to turn a complaint or issue into an experience for all parties involved to learn and benefit from, and made her the go-to person for the most difficult, sensitive, and volatile cases. Nancy is always willing to share her expertise with co-workers in order to help them learn and grow as Animal Control Officers. Those around her appreciate knowing that her cases will be handled efficiently, thoroughly, and correctly.

#### **Officer of the Year** **Katie Nash**

Officer Katie Nash is a six-year veteran of the Billings Police Department. Other officers can always count on her to assist them or offer advice during difficult situations. Officer Nash received a S.T.A.R. (Service, Teamwork, Achievement, Recognition) Award from the Detective Division in December 2011 for the quality and quantity of photos taken for her case files. Officer Nash has worked diligently as a volunteer Domestic Violence Investigator during 2011 and was selected to serve full-time in this capacity in 2012. One of the City's Victim Rights Advocates has commented that her investigations are impeccable and that her patient, calm, and confident manner in working with domestic violence victims is impressive. Officer Nash recently suffered a line-of-duty injury

and has been assigned to light duty work in the office. Whether in the field or in the office, Officer Nash's performance and quality of work is second to none. Officer Nash will also be honored at the Downtown Billings Exchange Club Crime Prevention luncheon on March 27, 2012.

#### **Supervisors of the Year** **Sgt. Mitch Hart & Sgt. Neil Lawrence**

Sgt. Hart has been a member of the Billings Police Department since 1993 and was promoted to Sergeant in 2003, joining the Detective Division two years ago. While Sgt. Hart is responsible for assigning cases to Detectives, you will see him working alongside his detectives assisting them with their cases, often meeting them on location with the Crime Scene Van. Sgt. Hart has recently brought the Detective's Division into the 21st Century by replacing and upgrading the interview cameras and recording system. Sgt. Hart strives to always give his best and encourages those under his command to do the same.

Sgt. Lawrence has been a member of the Billings Police Department since 1994 and was promoted to Sergeant in 2007. He is the senior member of the SWAT Team with 13 years of tactical experience. Sgt.

## Citizen's Award Officer Marc Snider

Officer Marc Snider was honored by the American Legion for their Citizen's Award at the February 13 City Council meeting. Officer Snider has stepped up to serve as an instructing member of the Alcohol Compliance Task Force. This task is vital to ensure that underage minors are not gaining access to alcohol through licensed vendors. To date, Officer Snider has completed over 120 compliance checks and assisted training over 400 employees of local establishments that serve or sell alcohol beverages.

## Award Nominees:

### Administrator of the Year Captain John Bedford

Captain John Bedford has been nominated to the Montana Association of Chiefs of Police for their Administrator of the Year Award. John has been a member of the Billings Police Department since 1997 and was promoted to Captain in 2008. Captain Bedford's dedication to officer safety by getting better technology for the department has been one of his top priorities. Captain Bedford has been instrumental in having a new, cost-effective, replacement program implemented for the department's aging fleet of vehicles. In 2011, he also started a pilot program that enabled the department to purchase three 4-wheel drive trucks, making it safer for officers to respond to calls during extreme winter conditions. Captain Bedford keeps and projects a positive attitude and is a great example for the officers.

### Respect for Law Officer Earl Campbell

Officer Earl Campbell was nominated and will be honored by the Billings Optimist Club for their Respect for Law Community Award at its annual luncheon on May 1, 2012. Officer Campbell has been with the Billings Police Department since 2000 and currently serves as a member of the Montana Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. Since this task force investigates and prosecutes those who use the Internet to exploit the youth of Montana, assignments to ICAC are strictly voluntary. Those who serve on this task force work behind the scenes, rarely receiving recognition for their efforts in putting these predators behind bars. Officer Campbell has worked diligently in the community to educate youth as to how their personal information on the Internet can be used by predators to gain the upper hand in exploiting them.

Congratulations to these Billings Police Department employees for their accomplishments in 2011.

## From Our Readers

### Questions and comments from Tom & Jane Zurbuchen, via email:

I enjoy the CityLink immensely, but why isn't the City's business a part of it? This spring, there was much talk of parks, both a City-wide maintenance district and lots of undeveloped park land. Where are all the undeveloped parks located and what happened to the maintenance district? There was a proposed Inner Belt Loop Plan B (just west of the Airport) that would require six months to get a feasibility answer from the FAA. It's been six months. What was the FAA's answer? There has been much talk of priority based budgeting. Was a consultant hired to assist the City? What are the principles and talking points to priority based budgeting? I urge you to include some real City business in the next issue.

### Answer:

The City's "business" is a part of this publication, but the timing of the CityLink hasn't always coincided with current events taking place in the City. Additionally, space is limited in the newsletter with twelve City departments attempting to communicate with the public regarding current events and programs. We make every effort to include pertinent information that the majority of the citizens will find interesting. An update on the priority based budgeting process is included in this issue, and we hope to address the

other suggestions you've made in upcoming issues.

### Questions and comments from Lester Bertsch:

I enjoy all of the articles – keep it up! I would like to see the run down in an upcoming issue of the recycling that goes on within the City. What is recycled and where does the money go?

### Answer:

In addition to the special recycling programs throughout the year, the City collects and recycles newspapers, aluminum, cardboard and vehicle batteries at the landfill. The Solid Waste Division also recycles, through local recycling firms, white goods (metal containing waste) at the landfill. The proceeds are returned to the Solid Waste Division's fund for continued recycling efforts.

There are four "Trash for Trees" recycling drop-off bins located throughout the City that accept newspapers and aluminum. The money collected from recycling from these bins goes into a fund for replacement trees in the parks. Additionally, there are a number of City departments who contract with local companies to complete shredding and recycling.

### Comments from an anonymous reader:

I like the entire newsletter. There are valuable dates, laws and information on construction. I enjoy

the service directory and find it useful. Please continue printing this newsletter, as those of us who don't have computers need to continue receiving it.

### Answer:

Thank you for your comments. We will continue printing the newsletter and inserting it in the Billings Gazette for distribution. Additionally, copies of the newsletter are available at each of the City's facilities. We have decided to scale the newsletter back to three times per year, rather than four, and will be looking at additional ways to communicate with the citizens of Billings.

### Comments and suggestions from Carol Gibson of Billings:

I like receiving news of what's going on in the City...up-coming plans and projects, as well as personnel news. In upcoming newsletters, I'd like to see reports on the progress of those plans and projects, as well as "glitches" encountered/solutions discovered, concerns and citizen responsibility regarding those plans and projects. ## Library Preparing Site for Construction

During the next few months, there will be plenty of activity around the Library building. Site preparation projects will lead up to the summertime start of construction for the new building approved by voters in November.

The first step will involve moving gas, electric, water and data lines. Currently, utility lines run through the alley

behind the existing Library. These lines run both over and under the site where the new Library will be built and must be moved prior to the start of construction. The utilities will all be rerouted out to North 29th Street before crossing under 6th Avenue North. This project will start in mid-March.

The next step will be the demolition of the former Underliner's Buick building on the southeast corner of North 29th St and 6th Avenue North.

The following step will be the reconfiguration of the parking lot. A land exchange with Stockman Bank allowed part of the new Library site to be acquired at no additional cost by exchanging it for property in the current library parking lot, which is adjacent to the new downtown Stockman Bank. When the Library takes over the building site, the bank will set up parking for its staff, building tenants and customers. The Library will reconfig-



ure and prepare the employee parking area on the west side of the current building to serve as customer parking for the Library.

After that, the new Library site will be excavated. Soil tests indicate that the site contains a type of clay that is unsuitable as a base for the new Library building. The clay ranges from five to 13 feet deep along the length of the site. This clay will be removed, and replaced with a solidly compacted and stable

fill material.

Once all the site preparation is completed, the actual construction process will be ready to start. An official groundbreaking ceremony is expected to take place in late June.

# City of Billings Solid Waste Division

Solid Waste, a division of the Public Works Department, provides commercial and residential garbage service for Billings. Residential service is assessed on the property taxes in the amount of \$98 per year for weekly collection, or about \$1.89 per week.

In the areas that have alleys, 300-gallon barrels are provided by the City to be shared by 2-3 households. Where alleys don't exist, each household is provided with a 90-gallon barrel on wheels. The residents with the 90-gallon barrels push the barrels out for collection on their day of service.

The office receives phone calls every day concerning different aspects of collection services. Therefore, staff thought it might be helpful to provide some guidelines for the residents of Billings regarding garbage collection.

## General Information

- Trash is collected from the public right-of-ways. Staff cannot come on to private property to remove items, even with the permission of the homeowner.
- Because of the risk of injury, items weighing more than 75 pounds cannot be collected by the solid waste workers.
- City ordinance states that refuse resulting from contracted work, be it tree trimmings, hot water heaters or carpeting, is required to be disposed of by the contractor, not the City.
- The Solid Waste Division has held an annual Toxic Waste Roundup for the past 18 years, at which time residents are allowed to bring items from their homes for disposal at no charge. The roundup is held the first Saturday following Memorial Day Weekend. Oil-based paint, stains, batteries, pesticides, herbicides and other toxic materials are collected at that time. Ammunition and prescription drugs may also be disposed of at this event. Mark your calendars!
- Used oil and anti-freeze are accepted at both the landfill and the Solid Waste Division Office, 4848 Midland Road, for year-round recycling.
- The Solid Waste Division accepts old household refrigerators and freezers at the landfill for a \$20 charge. The charge is for the recovery of the Freon by certified persons in the Division, which is required by federal and state regulations.
- The landfill is available for Billings and Yellowstone county residents to use at no charge for loads brought in vehicles no larger than a ¾ ton pickup. There is a charge for commercial use of

the landfill, for residents of other counties that the landfill serves, and for residents of the City of Laurel. Hours are 8 a.m. - 5:30 p.m., seven days a week from March through November. The landfill is closed on Sundays from December through February.

- The Solid Waste Division observes the major holidays which include New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. Your collection may be delayed by one day during those weeks. Watch for ads in the newspaper.
- Commercial containers should never be used by residential customers. They pay commercial rates for their service and this act would be considered a theft of services.

## Alley Service

- Use the alley barrel primarily for household trash.
- Top the barrel off with yard waste or larger items the day before collection.
- Keep the alley clean from your property to the middle of the alley.
- Place items too large for the barrel on your side of the alley for alley cleaning.
- Extra debris is cleaned from the alleys approximately every third week.
- Only residential trash should be placed in residential barrels.
- Lawn services or tree trimming companies must haul their own refuse.
- Branches need to be prepared in 4-foot lengths and bundled for pickup.
- Long items causing the lid to stand up can cause a mess when the barrel is emptied.
- To help prevent litter, bagging your trash is suggested.
- Residents should not move or turn barrels from where the City has placed them.

## Curb Service

- Collection service begins at 7 a.m., and barrels and any extra waste should be out.
- The barrel should be placed with the lid opening toward the street.
- Reasonable amounts of extra waste will be collected on the same day as the barrel.
- Extra barrels should be no larger than 32 gallons and should have outside handles.
- Extra should be placed at least 3-4 feet away

from the 90-gallon barrel.

- Branches need to be prepared in 4-foot lengths and bundled for pickup.
- Overfilling the barrel can cause a mess when the truck empties it.
- Placing the barrel away from obstacles (mailboxes, vehicles, etc.) is required.
- The truck must be able to reach the barrel from the street.
- Barrels cannot be stored at the curb and should be removed after being emptied.
- To help prevent litter, bagging your trash is suggested.



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# Got Drugs?

If you've been at City Hall lately, perhaps you've noticed the tall, green kiosk near the Police Department's window. That is a drug collection unit for anyone who has expired or unwanted pharmaceutical or over-the-counter drugs. This single unit is responsible for collecting hundreds of pounds of drugs in the first year of the program.

Why collect the drugs? Because so many drugs fall into the wrong hands and eventually end up on the street. Ask any officer, and he or she will tell you that these drugs have become a much larger problem than any of the illicit drugs we commonly associate with crime. The problem is multiplied when you consider the burglaries, thefts, and vandalisms committed to acquire the drugs.

Turning in these drugs also helps make our homes safer and prevent accidental ingestion by children, the elderly, and animals. Proper disposal of these drugs helps prevent contamination of ground water and drinking supplies as well.

The program's success has led to the purchase of three new collection units. These units will be placed in the outlying areas of the city to make collection more convenient. The Heights has a unit in place at the Custer National Forest Office at 1310 Main Street. West End residents will be able to use the kiosk at the Military Reserve Center located at 2917 Gable Road. The fourth unit is located in the City of Billings Solid Waste Division lobby at 4848 Midland Road.

## Summer 2012 Seasonal Employment



# New City Website



The City of Billings is excited to announce the launch of its new City Website on Thursday, April 12th. In the fall of 2011, City staff began working with Civic Plus, our current website hosting company, on a complete redesign of the main City website. As you can see from the snapshot image, the new site boasts a new look

and feel with better navigation and easier access to commonly requested information. Some of the new features include a front and center slide show to showcase pictures of the community, an expanded news section, an enhanced calendar, the current weather and temperature, a new photo gallery, and an Explore Billings section

that will highlight information about the community such as demographics, history, and tourism. In addition to the new main City website, the Airport, Library, Met Transit, Police, and Fire will also be unveiling an exciting new website design focused on improving access to information and better serving the community.

## Priority Based Budgeting

The City of Billings usually prepares its annual budget by starting with the current year's budget, then adding or subtracting from it to arrive at next year's spending level. This is called incremental budgeting. The method works reasonably well as long as revenues increase at about the same pace as expenses. That hasn't occurred in most states and in many cities for the past 3-4 years as the national economy worsened and tax collections declined. Some cities in financial crisis have turned to a different way of budgeting, called Priority Based Budgeting (PBB).

PBB is a method of aligning the budget with community service needs expressed by the City Council through its adopted goals

and objectives. By doing that, a city can reduce spending for low priority programs or expand spending for programs that meet citizens' highest priority needs despite a declining overall budget.

The City of Billings hired a Colorado firm that specializes in creating PBB budgets, and it is guiding the City Council and City staff through the process. The Council adopted its 2012 plans and goals, the senior staff helped to define how those goals will be accomplished, and staff is preparing lists of programs and their costs.

Those programs will be scored according to how well they help to meet City Council goals. The scoring results will be presented to City Council in May, along with the proposed FY 2013 budget. Plans are to partially implement PBB in this budget and to use it more fully when the City prepares its FY 2014 budget a year from now.
